Based on the above draft charter, on which we welcome comments, we seek one or more persons who would like to chair a Landscape Committee this year. Try it, you'll like it! One of the new activities we will begin this year is **shrub reduction and rejuvenation pruning**, which involves pruning of shrubs--specifically the euonymus and the Japanese hollies that have grown too large for the site or have become unsightly with age, along with some yews and other selected shrubs. Rejuvenation involves cutting the shrub to a height of 18 to 20 inches. The immediate impact will be an unattractive plant, but the shrubs will fill out by spring's end. By the end of summer you will see more vigorous growth, and the plants will be healthier over the long haul. We will begin this year in **Courts 12 to 16**.

Another change comes with the Board's approval of a proposal brought by **Carol Goodloe** on behalf of **red reflector** holders. Environmental Enhancements begins spring cleanup in March. All beds will be cut (or "carved"). However, after that step, no other actions will be taken by contractors on beds with approved red reflectors. Such reflectors indicate that residents will perform their own maintenance, including weeding, feeding, mulching, and pruning of all annuals, perennials, and shrubs. A signed waiver form must be submitted to the Board each year and is due to **Carol Goodloe by April 15.** A copy is included with this GLEN ECHO or may be found on the Glen's website at <u>www.fairlington.org/glenindex.htm</u>.

Finally, work is coming along nicely on the **renovation of the pool complex** (follow it in pictures at <u>http://fairlingtonglen.webs.com/index.htm</u>). We look forward to a much-improved facility for our staff, our guards, and for everyone in the community. Our property values will be enhanced by having such a fine facility. Between now and Memorial Day, you will begin to see finishing touches as the outside areas begin to look less like a construction site. **Melinda Patrician and Kathy Clatanoff** are joining forces to spearhead landscaping of the surrounding area, including the new entryway framed by beds, an archway, and planting pots. We will be ready for pool opening over Memorial Day weekend and a grand opening party on Saturday, May 30.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Thanks to all who turned in their emergency preparedness forms to **Maynard Dixon** and Court Reps last fall. Maynard has now compiled the information into a comprehensive worksheet for the Board's and management agent's use. Copies of individual response sheets for a court are also being provided to each court rep for their information and use as needed. We plan to expand on the database with information from management files and with another questionnaire this fall. **The Board thanks the Court Representatives Group and its chair, Maynard Dixon, for the good work done**.

The Court Representatives Group will be meeting on Tuesday, March 17, 2009, at the FCC.

Topics include: Spring clean-up; dealing with maintenance problems and violations; the new confidential Violations List; and any problems or proposals that fall under new business.

SPRING CLEANUP

Spring is just around the corner. Our landscape contractor will be cleaning up the common areas just as we will be out cleaning up our patios, front stoops and beds.

Please look around to see if there are items left in the common areas that should be put in your patios or thrown out (personal items should not be left outside the rear patio gate or in your front bushes, for example). Leaves in your patio should be bagged and put in the trash, not raked outside the gate to the common area. The final leaf blowing occurred in mid-February. See if there are broken window well covers that you should replace, screen doors that are a bit shabby, or other items needing repair.

Some court reps feel comfortable discussing possible problems with residents. The Board encourages such conversations, preferring to avoid violation letters on matters that can be taken care of with a conversation between neighbors.

TVs AND COMPUTERS

Getting a new TV or computer? Please don't throw the old one in the trash! Arlington residents can take old TVs and computers, which may contain lead and other harmful materials, to be recycled at the County's Electronics Collection and Recycling Center. The center accepts TVs (\$20 fee) and computer monitors (\$15 fee) every Saturday from 9 am until 3 pm at the Water Pollution Control Plant at 3402 S. Glebe Rd. This is the same place you can take paints and chemicals. Questions? Call 703-228-6832.

On Saturday, March 28 from 10 am to 2 pm you can take your electronics for recycling to the North Fairlington Community Center parking lot, 3005 S. Abingdon Street, where items will be taken directly from the trunk of your car. Computers, laptops, servers, monitors and LCD displays, and TVs are recycled for a \$10 fee. Other electronic items—basically anything else that plugs in—will be accepted free. Computer hard drive destruction is also available for a small fee. The rain date for this event is Saturday, April 4. Questions? Call Jeremy Farber at 703-436-1967 (Ext. 301).

RECREATION PASSES

It may still be a little chilly but it's never too soon to start dreaming of tennis, basketball and the pool! Owners and renters do not need to reapply for a recreation pass UNLESS they have lost a pass (and there is a \$5 charge for replacement passes) or if a family member has turned 12 in the last year and you have chosen to have individual passes. <u>New Owners and Renters</u> will need to submit an application. You can choose to get a family pass which can be used by all family members or have passes issued in individual names (for those12 and up).
