Collecting Emergency Contact Info

Last year at a monthly Board meeting, a Glen resident spoke to the Board about an incident in her court involving an elderly resident falling outside. While she was quick to help her neighbor in need, she also felt compelled to reach out to a relative or friend of the man to let them know that he was being taken to the hospital. But nobody had any info to offer her.



As a result of this story, there was much discussion about creating an Emergency Contact List for the Glen. The idea being that the Glen's Onsite Manager Amy Steliga could maintain a database of contact info for each unit that participates. This will not be mandatory; however, the more people who volunteer their info the better in case of a future emergency.

Information will be stored confidentially and will be accessible only in the case of an emergency through direct communication with the Glen's Onsite Manager.

- Your name / your unit's address / your court number.
- The name of an emergency contact person.
- The phone number of your emergency contact person.
- An email address of your emergency contact person.

This may bring back memories from elementary school when we had to have our parents fill out an emergency contact card at the beginning of the school year. Hopefully, the Glen will never need to get ahold of your contact, but should the need arise, the information will be available to management.

Latest News From the Board

The Fairlington Glen Board of Directors held their monthly meeting on Tuesday, May 12, 2026. Here are some of the highlights.

APPROVED

Moved to ratify the earlier unanimous email vote to revise the 2026 Pool Rules.

Moved to ratify the earlier unanimous email vote to approve a contract with James R. Walls Contracting in the amount of \$10,317 for roof repairs from inclement weather damage.

Moved to ratify the earlier unanimous email vote to approve a contract with James R. Walls Contracting in the amount of \$5,766 for attic sealing at 3605 S. Taylor Street (Court 8).

Moved to accept the proposal to asphalt coat the Court 12/13 alley. Motion passed 4-1, with the Treasurer voting not to approve.

NOTES

The President reminded all residents that the alley between Courts 12 & 13 must be kept clear during pool season. This alley serves as the emergency access to our pool. In the event of an emergency, first responders need this alley to access our pool safely and quickly.

The Treasurer announced that, at the end of this month, he is planning to circulate a draft budget for 2027, and an explanation for the newsletter, for a vote at the July Board meeting. He will be proposing a fee increase of 1.11%, unless the Board adds more expenses to his budget before the July monthly meeting.

The EV Charging project is moving forward. At this time, installation is targeted for July.

NEXT MEETING

The next monthly Board meeting is scheduled on Tuesday, June 9, 2026, at 6:30pm. Details to access the virtual meeting will be announced closer to the date.

CAUTION / Beware SPAM Email Messages

We continue to see evidence of spam email messages that are trying to solicit gift cards and other valuables while pretending to be members of the Glen Board or management staff.

Board members or Glen volunteers will never ask you for such things. When in doubt, always check the email address of the sender (it's not likely who it says) or consult with a Board member or our onsite manager before taking any action.

REMINDER - It's always best to delete such suspicious messages without clicking on any links or even responding at all.

Please Keep Pets Off the Courts

The Glen's pickleball and tennis courts are just for that - pickleball and tennis. These courts are available to Glen residents for these activities only.

Please do not bring pets onto the courts, as pets are not allowed.

As you can imagine, the Glen spends a great deal of money to maintain these courts for the recreational enjoyment of co-owners and residents.

If you are looking for an area to let your dog run free of a leash, please take your pet to the nearest dog exercise area, which is Utah Field.



Important Pet Owner Responsibilities



All pet owners must abide by Glen policy and Arlington County regulations concerning pets, including required vaccinations and licensing. Both a rabies vaccination tag and a County dog license tag must be secured on a dog's collar at all times.

A copy of Arlington County's regulations governing animal welfare may be obtained from the Department of Animal Control. All owners have sole legal and financial responsibility for the behavior of their pets.

When taken outdoors, dogs are to be kept on a leash at all times. Dogs are not permitted to run at large except at designated "off-leash" dog exercise areas located in Arlington County, the closest being Utah Field.

Pet owners must not allow their pets to make noise on a continuous or even frequent basis.

Pet owners (or their agents) must clean up after their dogs at all times. Dog waste should be deposited with regular household trash or in community trash cans located along the sidewalks in the Glen. Dog waste should never be dumped into a storm sewer because it then enters untreated into streams and rivers.

Fairlington Glen is a very dog-friendly neighborhood. But please follow these simple rules when it comes to your dog.

Please Keep the Alley Clear

**ACCESS FOR

At the Board's monthly meeting on May 12, 2026, President Charlie Robbins issued a reminder to all Glen residents that the alley between Courts 12 & 13 must be kept clear during pool season.

This is very important because that alley serves as the emergency access to the Glen Pool. In the event of an emergency, first responders need this alley to access our pool safely and quickly.



Another Reason for Fully Funded Reserves

The Glen is responsible for repairing/replacing the sewer pipes running under basement slabs. This requires that the concrete slabs be jack-hammered up and repaired during the replacement. An added cost is repair of any structural damage to the condition that it was in after the renovation of the units in the 1970's. For example, the Glen would give an owner an allowance equal to the cost of (1) replacing the slab covering with the type of

asphalt tiles that were installed after the 1970's conversion but not (2) the cost of porcelain tiles that were installed by a subsequent owner.

The lines under the slabs are aging cast iron pipes that will, sooner or later, have to be replaced. Until now, we have had to dig-out only the easier-to-replace laterals that connect with the County lines. These laterals connect perpendicularly with the two cast iron sewer pipes that run under the slab along the back side of a building. From this connection point, the lateral runs out from under the building and joins with a line that connects to the County line. The cost of replacing even these shorter lateral segments can be considerable. For example, we recently contracted to replace only 18 feet of one lateral running under a slab at a cost of \$10,039, which does not include an allowance for covering the repaired slab.

So far, we have not had to replace any of the longer cast iron pipes running under a slab along the back of each building. But it's a matter of "when," not "if." The cost of which could be considerable. For cost economies, we may have to dig-up and replace the entire length of each line running under the back of the basement slab, a repair that would involve every unit in the building. The cost would be reduced if we could re-line these pipes rather than dig-out their entire length; but, relining does not always work and would be more difficult for these harder-to-reach pipes.

To prepare for this type of expense, we need to build-up our reserves, rather than resort to borrowing and special assessments at high interest rates during uncertain economic times. If we do not fully fund our reserves, the Glen's latter-day residents will find themselves to be in a situation where transient, earlier residents who did not contribute to the full cost of replacing old assets moved on, leaving the latter-day residents to get stuck with the entire replacement cost. This has, in fact, been happening in neighboring associations, which have had to resort to special assessments to replace aging assets.

The Glen Remembers

Edward Francis McGonagle passed away peacefully on Sunday, April 26 while under the loving care of his wife, children, long-time aide Amy, and the Capital Caring Hospice team. He was fortunate to spend his last years at home in Fairlington Glen, where he lived for 50 years.

He was the long-time Court Rep for Court 9 and in retirement was frequently seen throughout our community riding his bike and walking dogs for neighbors at work.

Ed grew up in Belmont, MA, one of four siblings in a quintessential Irish American family. Until his illness, he was a gifted athlete, with ice hockey being his lifelong passion.



Ed McGonagle was 88.

He attended Belmont Hill Prep School near Boston, and Yale University in New Haven, CT, where he held many hockey records. He was captain of the hockey team and named All-Ivy at Yale during two of his years there. After college he played for the Washington Chiefs (precursor to the Capitals). Later he was a regional USA Hockey leader and became a youth hockey coach, including for two of his sons' teams. In later life, Ed played for the "GeriHatricks," a senior hockey group, which took him to the Senior Olympics even into his 80's.

After college, Ed spent three years in the Navy, and later the Navy Reserve. Much of that time was in South Korea, which left a lasting impression and motivated him to pursue a Master's Degree in East Asian History from Georgetown University. He was a Federal employee with the Navy Department for 35 years before retiring.

Ed's lasting legacy is his character. He was the embodiment of humility and grace. He had the kindest of hearts. He was an advocate for social justice and instilled those values in his children. He believed deeply in staying informed and was found each morning at the dining room table reading the Washington Post cover to cover. He made sure that his children always knew what was happening in the world and that they appreciated all of their blessings. He had the gift of Irish wit, and used it in quick and funny quips that made his wife laugh every day. His humor and wit were effortless. He was modest, strong and stoic, played fair, and always sought to improve himself. His world view was progressive and universal. He loved music, particularly jazz and trumpet music, dancing, jokes, and food, especially sweets. Road trips with the family always included him sneaking Little Debbies from under the driver's seat and somehow playing his travel trumpet while driving. Ed was a devoted and loving husband, father, and friend.

He died as he lived—humbly, stoically, without complaint. His spirit was strong until the end, even as his body and mind declined. Ed will be deeply missed and fondly remembered by his family, friends, and all those fortunate enough to know him.

He is survived by his wife, Betty; children, Kerry McGonagle Clark, Grady McGonagle, Maureen McGonagle, and stepson, Collin Anday; grandchildren, Ella and Aedan Anday, and Kieran Clark; sister, Jane McGonagle Kenney, and many nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his siblings Sally and John McGonagle, who were also key figures in his life.

Mosquito Season is Here Again; Fight the Bite!

Mosquitoes are a seasonal pest problem all over the United States, including here in Virginia. Generally, mosquito season begins in early spring, peaks in the summer when warmer weather brings more pests, and ends with the first freeze.



Weather often affects the mosquito population. For example, a long, hot summer affords mosquitoes more opportunities to breed and bite. Wet weather creates more standing water, which mosquitoes favor for breeding grounds. Mosquitoes feed by biting people or animals, and their prime dining hours are generally at dawn and dusk.

With mosquito season (May 1 - October 31 in Northern Virginia) here, let's review some relatively easy ways to enjoy our patios and other outdoor spaces while minimizing mosquitoes. If we each participate, then we can reduce their numbers.

The most important step is to eliminate potential mosquito breeding areas. They breed in water that is still for just a few days. You can help by:

- Unclogging gutter extensions in the front plant beds of your units and within your patios.
- Covering, turning over, or moving indoors any containers or toys that may collect water.
- Straightening sagging tarps or other covers to eliminate standing water.
- Filling in areas under outdoor faucets or air conditioning drains.
- Removing English Ivy (its dense nature allows it to hold in pooled water).
- Changing water regularly in bird baths in your patio.
- Using mosquito dunks in bird baths, fountains, or downspout extender openings (toxic to mosquito larvae, but not to birds).

DRESS
Dress in long sleeves and pants. This will help protect your skin from mosquito bites. Don't forget the socks!

DRAIN
Drain or dump standing water. The most common mosquito breeding grounds are water in flower pots, gutters, pet bowls, inflatable pools, and birdbaths.

DEFEND
Choose a mosquito repellent that has been registered by the Environmental Protection Agency. Registered products have been reviewed, approved and pose minimal risk for human safety when used according to label directions. Four repellents that are approved and recommended are:

- DEET (N,N-diethyl-m-toluamide)
- Picaridin (KBR 3023)
- Oil of lemon eucalyptus (p-methane 3,8-diol, or PMD)
- IR3535

Real Estate Taxes are Due June 15



The first installment of the 2026 Arlington County real estate taxes is due June 15, 2026. *Note, if the due date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday, late payment penalties will not be assessed for payments made on the following business day.*

Real estate bills have already been mailed. Remember, you will not receive a bill if your taxes are paid from an escrow account through your mortgage. If you have a mortgage and have received a bill, please contact your mortgage company immediately.

When real estate is sold, responsibility for payment of taxes is worked out during settlement. If you've sold the property referred to on the tax bill and another person has assumed responsibility for payment, return the bill to the Treasurer's Office, 2100 Clarendon Blvd, Suite 201, Arlington, VA 22201, with any information you have about the new owner. Contact your settlement attorney with any questions regarding who is responsible for paying taxes on the sold property.

Protect your Home When Away on Vacation

Summer is here, and you and your family may be ready for your annual vacation. Before you leave home, consider these valuable tips to keep your home safe while you're away.

1. If your home has an alarm system, arm it when you leave.
2. Consider hiring a house sitter to occupy your home while you're gone.
3. Hide all of your valuables, such as jewelry and computers, so that they are out of plain sight, especially from a window. Small expensive or sentimental items should be locked in a safe.
4. Secure and lock all windows and doors. It never hurts to double check before you leave.
5. Use lights with timers or smart lighting. A dark home over many nights is a sure sign of an absent owner. Timed lighting gives the appearance of activity.
6. Unplug devices such as computers and TV's. Leave only a refrigerator, freezer, and lights on timers plugged in. Electrical issues are a common cause of home fires. Limit your risk by pulling the plug on unnecessary devices and using surge protectors for those that remain connected.
7. Notify a trusted neighbor that you'll be gone and ask them to keep an eye on things for you. Ask them to take in any packages that are delivered. Suggest that they occupy your parking space with their second vehicle while you're away.
8. As difficult as this may be for some, stay off of social media while you're on vacation. Wait until you're home to post your pics and share your details.
